**FROM THE PASTOR:**

Brothers and Sisters-

Auburn Presbyterian is in the process of doing some work on the offices and things are really disordered. My wife has been called to a new position with the church and my son is looking at colleges. My aunt and uncle were evacuated from their home in Wilmington and this past week two friends of our family passed away. It seems like nearly everything in my life is changing. With everything in transition it's hard to function.

This is my experience, but I think this sense of being caught up in change is common to everyone in the country. Some people call this condition of our society an "unraveling", which is to say that the institutions, systems, and processes that seemed to work so well no longer function. Those things that we used to depend upon are no longer so trustworthy. Examples of this change surround us, from the Lions Club to Tri Kappa, church and government, everything seems to be coming apart and unraveling. If we talk about it or not, on some level we all know that something is going on.

As I just wrote, the church is not exempt from this unraveling. It might be better said that the church is one of the most notable examples of the transition going on. It is a struggle to understand why people no longer attend Sunday worship, why the church is no longer as relevant to people as it was a generation ago. The institution that means so much to us seems to have lost significance to the larger society.

Every pundit and prophet has an opinion on what is happening with the church and what to do about it. The market is flooded with books on the subject. That is a conversation in itself which has no end and is more confusing than helpful. What I wanted to write about is our sense of being unmoored and adrift in the middle of all this change.

When things become unsettled and uncertain it's only natural to try to hang onto anything that promises stability. A lot of the time this also means trying to revert back to whatever we did before in the hope that it will end up differently than it has. Most of us have wonderful memories of what the church was like "back then" and we long for a return to those days. Unfortunately, we are unable to turn the clock back.

Christians have added resources in the face of all this change, though. First off, we have our Scriptures to draw upon. Particularly, there is Psalm 46 which reminds us that God is our ever-present strength and stay. Jesus himself reminds us that he is always with us. These passages remind us that, no matter how much the world shifts and changes, we can always count on God and lean on God when the ground is unsteady.

I also want to remind you of our Sunday gatherings. In worship we remember more of God's word to us, but this is also the place we gather to support one another. In our worship we engage in a liturgy and practices that are timeless. For example, just the simple act of passing the peace reconnects us with one another and welcomes the Holy Spirit into our lives together.

Finally, Scripture and liturgical practices are things that we can take away from our faith community. We take them out and practice them in the larger community. It is in that sharing that we become evangelists, we spread the hope and promise that we have found through our faith. The world is changing and with Scripture, church, and fellowship God gives us the resources we need to weather those storms.

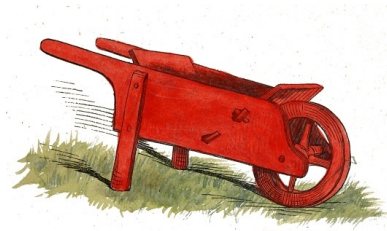

**A NOTE SENT FROM THE OGLESBEE FAMILY - Jonathan & Stephen Oglesbee**

Our father, Ronald Oglesbee, served as pastor of Auburn Presbyterian Church from 1978-1985. We're writing to you on behalf of our mother to share information about his life and death, as well as details about a memorial service that is planned for later in October. We would be grateful to you for sharing this information with the congregation in a manner you see fit.

Rev. Ronald L. Oglesbee [1937-2018] went to his heavenly rest Saturday evening, September 22. Ron died peacefully at home. A life of service to the Presbyterian Church spanning more than 50 years, he was pastor to congregations in Ohio, Pennsylvania, Indiana, Virginia and California. He was one of the founders of the Southeast Asia Partnership of Los Ranchos Presbytery with service in Vietnam and Thailand. His commitment to ministry remained constant into his retirement; he and his wife Evelyn taught for seven years at McGilvary College of Divinity in Chiang Mai, Thailand. With a life-long love of music, Ron's interests varied widely from woodworking to camping, photography and technology. He even earned his small plane pilot's license in his early sixties.

Ron is survived by his wife Evelyn, son Stephen and daughter-in-law Kendra, son Jonathan and daughter-in-law Barbara, and numerous grandchildren and great grandchildren.

A Service of Witness to the Resurrection giving thanks for the life of Rev. Ronald Oglesbee will be held at Grace First Presbyterian Church (3955 N. Studebaker Rd, Long Beach CA 90808) on Saturday October 27 at 11:00 a.m. A lite lunch reception will be held in the Marilyn Saul Ministry Center immediately following the service.
