FROM THE PASTOR:

Brothers and Sisters,

As I write this, the General Assembly (GA) of the PC(USA) is meeting in Louisville, KY. Every two years each presbytery elects commissioners to GA and those commissioners review the work of synods, resolve controversies in the church, consider matters of common concern for the whole church, and serve as a symbol of unity. The Book of Order sets out the responsibilities of the General Assembly more specifically.

Primarily the GA protects the church from errors in faith and practice. It does this by assuring that the expression of our theology remains true to the biblical standards in our historic confessions. The work of the GA presents a witness for truth and justice in our local and world communities. Finally, the Book of Order holds the GA responsible for setting priorities for the church and establishing relationships with other churches or ecumenical bodies.

GA's first order of business is to elect a moderator for the assembly who will serve for two years, until the next meeting of the GA. As soon as a moderator is selected, the assembly breaks up into committees to consider proposals. The work of the committees comes from the Office of the General Assembly (OGA), the Presbyterian Mission Agency (PMA), overtures from synods and presbyteries, and, finally, resolutions generated by the committees themselves.

The committees bring the results of their consideration back to the whole assembly where a final decision happens and the course of the church is plotted. These decisions go back to the presbyteries for some more ratification, but I'll explain that process in another newsletter.

Covid has influenced the work of the General Assembly. The last GA was all virtual and met online. This year commissioners gathered, but in smaller numbers, which meant that the work took longer. The assembly is usually only a week, but this year it is going to take closer to three weeks to complete all the business.

I have been talking about coming together for conversation. That is the model that the Presbyterian Church uses and GA is an example. At the General Assembly a representative sample comes together to listen to each other's ideas and discern what direction God is calling us. And then we even talk it over some more so there's a lot of space for God's Spirit to enter into the process.


