I was reading Christian Century a couple of weeks ago and ran across a Gallup Poll. The poll described the declining number of Americans who believe in God. I had to look at that twice – a decline in the belief in God. We're used to seeing numbers detailing the reduction in church attendance offset by an increase in people who claim to be spiritual but not religious. I've come to expect those statistics, but a reduction in the number who believe in God...

Some of you might remember back in the 60's and 70's when the phrase "God is Dead" began to be tossed around. The notion that God is dead began with Nietzsche in the 19th century but was given new life in the 20th. Even though Gallup charts a high belief in God at that time, I think those were the beginning rumbles of the present earthquake. These philosophers and theologians were able to envision the impact of the growth in human knowledge.


With our advances in science and technology, it seems like nothing is beyond us. We have developed the perspective that everything is within our grasp, nothing is beyond us. When we see the world that way, there is no need for God. We even begin to ask what God has done for us since we either have or will master every challenge that faces us. And it seems like we have done all this without any effort on God's part. If that's our perspective, a belief in God becomes nothing more than a quaint notion.

Writing this makes me think about the Jeremiah text we read just this last Sunday – the people chased after false idols, "ungods". I remember the Israelites in the wilderness who made a golden calf when it seemed like God was nowhere to be found. What happens when our culture puts science, technology, and human achievement on an altar for worship? Since we're a part of this culture, can we avoid being influenced by an inflated view of human agency?

The Gallup statistics have been on my mind and have been central in several of my conversations this month. One person asked me if I thought there were people in church who didn't believe in God. I want to say no, I'd like to think that everyone in church believes in God. What I do think is that our beliefs have changed tremendously, especially in the last few decades. Our theology has lost some of the mystery and majesty once attributed to God. God is no longer sovereign over everything and we create parts of our lives we believe are exempt from God's influence. We might profess an omnipotent God, but we don't really expect God to work miracles in the world. Surrounded by a culture of human achievement, our faith has changed.

How would you respond to the Gallup Poll? What do you think about God? How does God work in the world? In your life?


