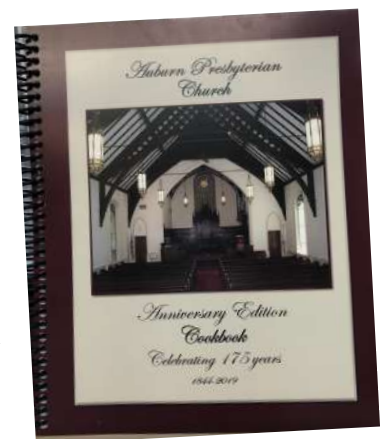

FROM THE PASTOR

Brothers and Sisters:

*Then I confessed my sins to you; I did not conceal my wrongdoings.
I decided to confess them to you, and you forgave all my sins.
(Psalm 32:5)*

I got an interesting letter this week. The postal worker brought an envelope with no return address sent to my attention in care of the church. I receive letters like this regularly, so getting mail is not that noteworthy. What is worthy of comment was what the envelope contained.

I opened the letter to find a short note and some money. The note went on to describe an incident that happened here at this church. When this person was much younger they coveted something. For some unknown reason, this was something the person felt they had to have. Unable to resist the temptation, this person stuck it in their pocket, but that's not the end of the story. I'm not sure how long, but this bothered this person. It bothered them so much they reached out to me.

I know we have all harmed someone in one way or another. I'm going to go out on a limb and guess that almost all of us have stolen something. And probably the same percentage of us have intentionally used our words to hurt someone. How many lies have we told; how many confidences have we betrayed; how many relationships have we broken? Gosh, I hate to acknowledge the magnitude of my sin!

Lent is a season of self-examination and contrition, which makes this writing so appropriate. The truth is, most of us go through our days giving little mind to our sins, but this is a season in the church year when we try to be especially mindful of our shortcomings. More than just mindful, I encourage you to contemplate how you might make amends for your wrongs. Sometimes those amends can be a simple acknowledgement of what we did and an apology. Other times our amends are more difficult and require that we work on our relationships.

God asks only that we acknowledge our wrongs by making confession and seek God's forgiveness. Scripture tells us that through this practice we are forgiven. My experience is that, even knowing God's grace and mercy, arriving at the feeling of forgiveness is an involved process. Forgiveness involves communication with God, others, and myself in order to feel complete.

That letter? I know that God forgives the person who wrote me. I know that God had already forgiven them, but I pray that the practice of confession and amend making brought them the peace for which they long.

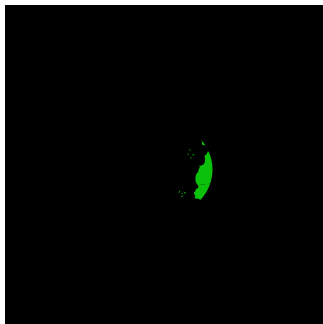

ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL

March 1: A Poetry Session – Five Poems with Biblical References. Our guest will be Auburn resident Bob Wilson, who will lead us in a discussion of five of his poems and in the inspiration behind them. Bob is a retired high school teacher whose poems have appeared in various journals and whose essays have appeared in publications ranging from *The Illustrated History of World War II* to *National Coach and Athletic Director*. A

collection of Bob's poetry was published last year by Yavanika Press; a second collection, *The Other Side of the Sky*, will be published by the Lily Poetry Review in March 2021.

March 8: Habitat for Humanity. Our guest will be Habitat's Northeast Indiana director Mary Ann Stanley, who will update us on building projects and discuss the needs of this important ministry, which our church supports.

March 15: Our Methodist Friends. The Rev. Jim Farrer of Auburn's First United Methodist Church will talk with us about a major decision his denomination faces this year – whether to stay united. Methodist churches everywhere are considering proposals to formally split the denomination based on questions dealing with sexuality. Those questions deal specifically with whether to allow same-sex unions and to ordain homosexuals as ministers.

March 22: To Be Announced.

March 29: Fred Rogers. The man who created and hosted the long-running and highly acclaimed preschool television series *Mister Rogers' Neighborhood* was a Presbyterian minister. Tom Hanks portrays Mr. Fred Rogers in the 2019 critically acclaimed film "A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood," based on Rogers' life and on his commitment to promoting kindness. The class will view this film over the course of two Sundays.

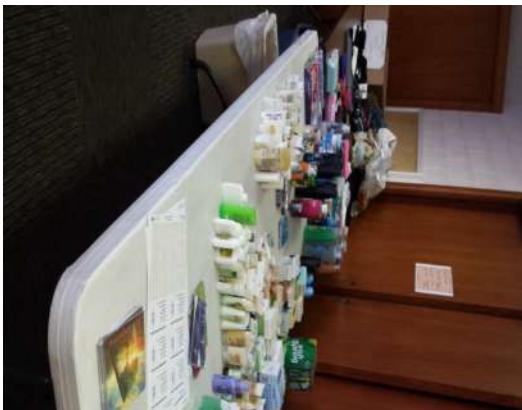
